Route 4 – North Norfolk 2



# PLAP Route 4 – North Norfolk 2

**Distance**: Approximately 12 miles

Map: Ordnance Survey Explorer Map Number 250 (Map 1:25000)

**Notes**: Take care when identifying tracks as many on this route cross or are on private land. See the online Norfolk interactive map showing rights of way.

North Norfolk offers carriage drivers/riders a wide variety of landscapes, from rolling open farmland to heathland and cultivated fenland

Miles of open countryside exists – much of which is off-road and seemingly far from habitation.

It's important to take care when identifying tracks as many are on private land. Norfolk County Council's Countryside Access Department offers an interactive map online service which enables people to identify the rights of way on routes and areas where public access to the countryside is possible.

Two drives/rides of approximately 12 miles have been identified. This ride combines carriage driving/riding using private farmland and minor lanes at Abbey Farm, East Walton. Both routes follow part of the Peddars Way which is a long-distance trail based on a roman road running from Knettishall Heath in Suffolk to Holme-next-the-Sea on the North Norfolk coast.

The two identified routes are obviously intended for more active drivers and riders seeking access to all forms of off-road opportunity, but the area also offers a number of shorter routes on quiet lanes through which it is possible to really enjoy driving a carriage quietly around the countryside at a slower pace.

### **Route Description**

From St Mary's Church follow the main village road southwards, keeping the pond on your left.

Pass Lynn Lane on your right – (opposite the southern end of the pond) and continue along Castle Acre Road.

A short distance after passing Lings Country Goods (Heath Farm) on your right is a fork junction. Follow the right-hand fork of this down Drunken Drove.

After about a mile the Peddars Way crosses the road. Turn right (northwards) here.

Continue along this track for approximately two miles (crossing over two roads) until you can see the A 148 directly in front of you. Just before this, turn left along the back of the Dogotel Kennels and Cattery, and left again just after the boundary of the land owned by the Kennels finishes.

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Follow the field edge for approximately half a mile before reaching another track crossing at right angles. Turn right and continue round the edge of the wood.

After approximately one mile you will see a small belt of trees on your left.

Continue to follow this track until reaching another crossing of two lanes/tracks. (The sign is ahead of you and not very obvious).

Turn left (Eastgate Drove) to Congham Heath Wood.

Turn left when you meet the tarmac road and continue for approximately 2.5 miles until you reach West Heath Farm on your left.

Cross straight over the Peddars Way and return to Great Massingham.

The British Horse Society can provide public liability and personal accident insurance cover as well as many benefits if you join as a member (terms and conditions and territorial limits apply).
